The LPJK Members join the **Strengthening of National Values Program**



The strengthening of national values program that lasted for a week was aimed at equipping the participants with national values sourced from the four basic consensus of the nation which was used as the foundation in the life of society, nation and state.

The Governor of Lemhannas RI Lieut. Gen. (Ret.) Agus Widjojo opened the Strengthening of National Values Program for the National Construction Development Agency (LPJK) on Monday (24/2) in the Pancasila Room, Trigatra Building, Lemhannas RI.

In his remarks, Agus said that the strengthening of national values program that lasted for a week was aimed at equipping the participants with national values sourced from the four basic consensus of the nation which was used as the foundation in the life of society, nation and state.

In addition to the national values materials sourced from the four basic consensus of the nation, eighty participants from various regions in Indonesia were also given

an understanding of the archipelagic insight, national resilience, national leadership, and national vigilance. The learning methods used are lectures and questions and answers, group and intergroup discussions, participants coaching, and outbound.

LPJK itself has several main task such as encouraging research, development, education and training in construction services, registering construction service business entities, registering labor which includes classification, qualifications, and certifications, encouraging skills and expertise, encouraging and enhancing the role of arbitration, mediation, and expert appraisers in the field of construction services.

In addition, LPJK also has an important role and function in establishing and fostering good

and harmonious relations with stakeholders, community, and government agencies both at the central and regional levels.

By having the provision of national insight and national values, it is expected that LPJK will be able to prioritize the interests of the nation and the state above personal or group interests.

"Thus, it would be very appropriate for LPJK to join the strengthening national values program, as a form of concern and responsibility to the nation," Agus concluded.

Mobile Mamografi comes to Lemhannas RI

Perista of Lemhannas RI (Lemhannas RI's Officials' Wives Association) in collaboration with the Indonesian Breast Cancer Foundation (YKPI) and Dharmais Cancer Hospital held a mammography examination for Perista of Lemhannas RI members and Lemhannas RI's Female Officials on Thursday (27/2) at Lemhannas RI.

"The purpose of this Mammography is to provide health checks, breasts check, to Lemhannas RI's employees and Perista members," Acting Chairwoman of Perista of Lemhannas RI Lisa Wieko Syofyan said. This activity is one of Lemhannas RI socio-cultural work programs within the framework of the 55th Lemhannas RI Anniversary.

Lisa also explained that the program was planned to be an annual routine program to increase the awareness of Perista members and Lemhannas RI's female employees on personal health.

"I hope this activity can make us, especially women in Lemhannas RI, aware of personal health especially breast health," Lisa said.

On the occasion, A Doctor of Early Detection Polyclinic of Dharmais Cancer Hospital, dr. Rinilda Caesar who came to perform physical examination to Perista members and Lemhannas' female employees. dr. Rinilda also explained about Sadari method (breast self-examination), "Sadari can be done by every woman after their period or when they are taking a shower," dr. Rinilda said.



Dr. Rinilda explained that 3D concept can be done to make it easier for women to do a Sadari examination. The first D is *Dilihat (to see)* which means to check whether the shape of her breasts are symmetrical or not and whether there are wounds or not. The second D is *Diraba (to touch)*, which aims to check whether there is a lump in the breast or not. Then, the third D is *Ditekan (to press)*, which aims to what comes out when the nipples are pressed. Furthermore, dr. Rinilda explained that if there were complaints, it can be followed by further examinations by medical staffs and machines such as Mammography, USG, and MRI.

Mammography Car Radiographer, Demayanti, recommends that Mammography should be performed by at least forty-year-old women and done once a year. "Mammography is a breast examination for at least

forty-year-old women. If you are under the age of forty, the examination can be done through breast MRI," Demayanti said.

"We sincerely want to examine Indonesian women with mammography. Let's check our personal health as early as possible for the sake of the health of Indonesian women," Demayanti said.

Currently, Mobile Mammography has provided services in several Jabodetabek (Jakarta, Bogor, Depok, Tangerang, and Bekasi) areas and DKI Jakarta Health Centers. The YKPI Jakarta Secretariat is willing to present a Mobile Mammography if it is requested by the public.

Lemhannas RI holds a Dialogue on National Insights in Yogyakarta

In addition, Wieko and Ryan also exchanged information about professional experts in each institution. "Professionals Experts consist of retired civilians and military officers," Wieko said, explaining about Lemhannas RI professional experts. National Defense is the Spirit of the Total Peoples's Defense and Security System



Lemhannas RI Held an Intellectual Exercise with the theme "Preparing the Establishment of Reserve Components to Strengthen National Defense" on Thursday (5/3) in the Kresna Room, Lemhannas RI.

Attended the Intellectual Exercise was the Director General of Defense Potential of the Ministry of Defense of the Republic of Indonesia Prof. Dr. Ir. Bondan Tiara Sofyan, M.Sc. as a guest speaker. Bondan stated that Law no. 23 of 2019 concerning Management of National Resources for National Defense (PSDN) is a law made to support national defense.

On that occasion, Bondan explained that the threats that we are facing today are not only military and non-military threats, but also hybrid threats. The hybrid threat is a combination of military threats and

non-military threats that are threatening national defense and security.

On that occasion, Bondan also said that in Law no. 23 of 2019, in accordance with Law no. 3 of 2002 regulates people participation in state defense. There are four ways namely civics, compulsory military basic training for prospective reserve component candidates, service as voluntary and compulsory TNI soldiers, and service in accordance with each profession.

"State Defense is the spirit of the Total People's Defense and Security System (Sishankamrata), that all citizens participate in national defense," Bondan said. *Sishankamrata* involves all citizens, territories and other national resources, and is prepared early by the government and held in a total, integrated, directed, and continuing manner.

Pancasila in the Globalization Era



The Deputy for Strategic Studies Prof. Dr. Ir. Reni Mayerni, M.P opened the Focus Group Discussion (FGD) on Finding Forms of the Implementation of Pancasila Values in the Globalization Era, which took place on Monday (9/3) in the Gatot Kaca Room, Astagatra Building 3rd Floor, Lemhannas RI.

"The resilience of the Pancasila ideology is again tested when the world entered the era of globalization where many alternative ideologies penetrated the entire nation's foundations through media that everyone can reach," Reni said while giving a speech opening the FGD.

Reni explained that Pancasila is actually an open ideology which means an ideology that is able to absorb new values that could be beneficial for the survival of the nation. However, on the other hand there is a need for national vigilance towards new ideologies. If Indonesia is not careful, then the community will tend to go along with the flow of other ideology, while the original ideology of Indonesian,

Pancasila, is forgotten, both its values and their implementation in daily life.

House of Representatives Commission I member Dave Akbarshah Fikarno Laksono, M.E., explained about the challenges that is currently being faced. The first challenge is the many alternative ideologies through information media that are easily accessible to children such as radicalism, extremism, and consumerism. It also makes the community experience a decrease in the intensity of Pancasila learning and also the lack of effectiveness of Pancasila learning.

Responding to Dave's statement, Policy Analyst of the Directorate of Senior High School Education of Ministry of Education and Culture (Kemendikbud) of the Republic of Indonesia Dr. Juandanilisyah, S.E., M.A., explained that Pancasila is currently taught and strengthened through Civics Education (PPKN) subjects with an emphasis on theory and practice. Because it is undeniable that the effects of global development also have an impact on

children. "Pancasila is now said to be the direction of state policy and we continue to practice it," Juan said.

While the Political Psychology of the University of Indonesia Prof. Dr. Hamdi Moeloek sees that the social representation of Pancasila that people should remember is the Pancasila ideology of tolerance, the Pancasila ideology of pluralism, and the Pancasila ideology of multiculturalism. The social representation of Pancasila means the frame of reference for the values of the state and nation that constitutes the identity of Indonesia. Hamdi explained that if Pancasila became a reference, then the implementation of Pancasila values would be more easily seen in state practice. He also explained that Pancasila could also provide a solution amid the existence of various ideologies such as socialist and liberal as well as amidst political identity efforts by religion, ethnicity, and interests.

Internalization of Legal and Regulatory Awareness Management



Lemhannas RI held a socialization of Law and Legislative Regulations Awareness on "Policy on regulatory formulation of the legal system and omnibus law in the National Legal System" on Monday (9/3) at the Gajah Mada Auditorium, Pancagatra Building 3rd Floor, Lemhannas RI.

The current state legislative system requires a fundamental and massive restructuring. Overlapping regulations both in horizontal and vertical hierarchical relations is alleged to be a barrier to certain sectors that affect national development.

"To overcome these problems, the Government is trying to simplify by resolving conflicting laws and regulations quickly, practically, and efficiently through the Omnibus Law," said the Chief of the Cooperation

and Legal Bureau, First Admiral Budi Setiawan who read the remarks of the Prime Secretary of Lemhannas RI, Police Commissioner General Drs. Mochamad Iriawan, S.H., M.M., M.H.

Dr. Nasrudin, S.H., M.M. as the Expert Staff of the Director General of Laws and Regulations of the Ministry of Law and Human Rights conveyed, there are three legal objectives, the first is legal certainty which is the basis of statutory provisions, propriety, and justice in every government administration policy. Second, justice which means the same treatment in accordance with their rights and obligations, and the third is the benefit which means giving maximum benefit to as many people as possible.

Responded to Nasrudin's statement, Bivitri Susanti, a constitutional law expert, explained

that the positive aspect of the Omnibus Law is it can tidy up and harmonize overlapping arrangements, on a topic regulated in different laws or regulations for governments and stakeholders who need a quick change in a regulation.

In addition, the Omnibus Law also has negative aspects. One of those negative aspects is the "Omnibus" method is not simple and confusing. It also tend to hide the important things because it contain many aspects which cause the compilers and reviewers fail to see the effect and implications of a law in practice. "

"In addition, it is also considered not democratic because of its wide scope and it often cause a slip that is politically unacceptable. The negative aspects cause several countries leave this omnibus law method," Bivitri continued.

Bivitri said that there are two things that must be used as a big framework, the first in terms of constitutional framework, it is a product of legislation that must be in two corridors, namely the constitutional corridor and constitutionalism that must also be fulfilled. "Because the Omnibus Law is a a law, it is not only a constitution but it must also be fully subject to Law number 12 of 2011," Bivitri added. An Omnibus Law must follow Law number 12 of 2011 and abide by the Principle of the establishment of appropriate laws and regulations, as well as the techniques for legislation arrangement.

Agus Widjojo : “Understand and Implement the National Values”

We, As a great nation, must maintain, understand, and implement the national values in order to maintain the NKRI (Unitary State of the Republic of Indonesia)," the Governor of Lemhannas RI Lieut. Gen. (Ret.) Agus Widjojo said at the opening ceremony of the Strengthening National Values Program for Bureaucrats, Academics, Community Leaders, Professional Organizations, TNI (the Indonesian Military) and Polri (the Indonesian Police) on Tuesday (10/3), at The Papandayan Hotel.

Indonesian can use its richness in variety of ethnicities, cultures, languages, groups and religions as a positive strength that can support the nation's development. But on the other hand, it also contains the potential for conflict if its richness is not managed properly which can threaten the survival and integrity of the Republic of Indonesia.

In addition to the potential for conflict over diversity, the development of global, regional and national strategic environments, the development of science and technology in the industrial era 4.0, the era of society 5.0, and the spread of foreign cultures into the lives of Indonesian people also become challenges for Indonesia. The challenge that arises is how to assemble the sustainability of the mindset, attitude, and behavior of the Indonesia as a nation based on national values derived from the four basic consensus of the nation as a foundation in formulating national policies in the fields of geography, demography, natural resources, ideology, politics, economics, social culture, and defense and security.

This strengthening program held for a week is one of Lemhannas RI's



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responses to the current problems faced by this nation, namely the waning of national values which are sourced from the four basic consensus of the nation namely Pancasila, the 1945 Constitution of the Republic of Indonesia, the Unity in Diversity and the Unitary State of the Republic of Indonesia, especially among the the next generation.

The Strengthening National Values Program aims to transform, grow and preserve national values to every component of the nation sourced from Pancasila, the 1945 Constitution of the Republic of Indonesia, the Unity in Diversity, and the Unitary State of the Republic of Indonesia. It is hoped that these national values can be reflected in the thoughts, attitudes and behavior of every Indonesian citizen, to understand the importance of prioritizing the unity and integrity of the nation and regional unity in the life of society, nation and state.

KPK promotes **Anti-Corruption Culture** in Lemhannas RI



Corruption in Indonesia is no longer an ordinary crime, but it is an extraordinary crime because of its wide impact on society," the Head of the General Affair Bureau of Lemhannas RI Brigadier General Drs. S. E. Pranggono said in the opening the Socialization of Anti-Corruption Culture and wealth report mechanism as a Corruption Prevention Effort on Wednesday (11/3), at the Gajah Mada Auditorium, Lemhannas RI.

Being an extraordinary crime, corruption is also a crucial problem faced by Indonesia which can occur in all institutions from the lowest to the highest level. In eradicating corruption, every Indonesian society must instill anti-corruption values in daily life. The anti-corruption values that must be implemented are honest, caring, independent, disciplined, responsible, hard working, simple, brave, and fair.

"Corruption prevention in Indonesia will never succeed optimally if it is only

carried out by the government without involving wider community," Pranggono said. According to Pranggono, all levels of society must be actively involved in corruption prevention and eradication in Indonesia.

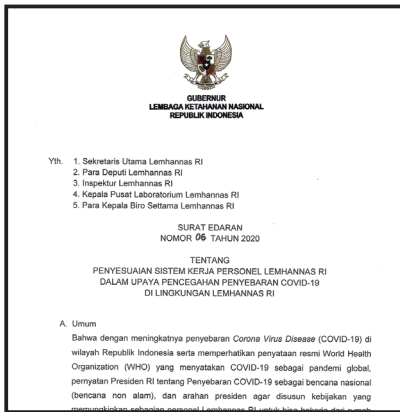
Supporting Pranggono's statement, the Director for Public Education and Services of Corruption Eradication Commission (KPK) Giri Suprapdiono who was present as a guest speaker explained that being honest means straight-hearted, strong self-concept, and the main value was straightforward. Furthermore, caring means loving the truth and everything outside ourselves. Then being independent is self-reliant and focused on the abilities of present and future self. The last is simple which means strong self-awareness, neat, polite, not excessive, and appreciate the process, achievement, and results.

Then Giri also explained the corruption eradication strategy

carried out by the KPK, namely enforcement, prevention, and education and community participation. "The enforcement aims to make people afraid of doing corruption. Afraid of being severely punished, impoverished, socially punished, politically punished, those are punishment for deterrence. While the prevention aims to make people avoid doing corruption," Giri said.

Giri further explained that prevention efforts were implemented by providing CCTVs which records could be used as an evidence, sufficient payroll systems so that people were afraid of losing their salaries, and a technological system that cannot commit fraud. Then education means conducting socialization like in Lemhannas RI. "The aim of education is that people do not want to do corruption not only because they are afraid or not because they cannot do it, but because they do not want to," Giri said.

Lemhannas RI efforts to prevent the Spread of COVID-19



Responding to the latest developments of the increasing spread of Corona Virus (COVID-19) in Indonesia, Lemhannas RI made some adjustments to the work system of Lemhannas RI's Officials through the Circular Letter of the Governor of Lemhannas RI Number 06 of 2020 dated March 17, 2020 as an effort to prevent and to minimize the spread of COVID-19. The Governor of Lemhannas RI Lieut. Gen. Agus Widjojo allows some Lemhannas RI's officials to work from home. However, the two highest level structural officials in

each work unit still have to carry out their duties in the office to make sure the government administration and services to the public can run smoothly with several adjustment.

It was also explained, that the heads of work units regulate an accountable work system and selectively regulate officials / personnel in their work units who could work at home through the distribution of attendance by considering the type of work carried out by each official, COVID-19 distribution map issued by the central government / local government, officials domicile, health conditions of officials and their families (in the status of monitoring / suspected / under surveillance / confirmed infected with COVID-19), history of overseas trips of Lemhannas RI's Officials in the last fourteen days, as well as the effectiveness in carrying out tasks and organizational unit services.

In connection with the Organization of Activities and Travel Services, in the circular, it was stated that all face-to-

face organizing which presented many participants both within the Republic of Indonesia's National Resilience Institute and in regional areas to be postponed or canceled, organizing meetings to be held very selectively according to the level of priority and urgency required must be resolved by utilizing information and communication technology or through available electronic media.

However, if there is a very high urgency and meetings and / or other activities must be held in the office, social distancing must be implemented. In addition, domestic official travel must be carried out selectively according to the level of priority and urgency and postpone overseas official travel.

The implementation of work from home as intended, is valid from March 17, 2020 to March 31, 2020 and will be further evaluated, according to the development of the situation. After the expiry of the validity of this work system the head of the work unit will evaluate the effectiveness of its implementation and report it to the Governor of Lemhannas RI.

Mitigating the Spread of COVID-19, Lemhannas RI Office Sprayed with Disinfectant

Having adjusted the work system for its personnel as well as checking their body temperature and throats, Lemhannas RI has proceeded to spray disinfectant on its office facilities as a part of an effort to mitigate the spread of coronavirus disease (COVID-19).

Working together with the Indonesian Red Cross (PMI), the disinfectant spraying was carried out on Friday, 20 March 2020. On the opportunity, the PMI conveyed that the disinfectant solution being sprayed is a mixture of virkon and clean water at a

ratio of 1:10, respectively.

The disinfectant spraying was focused mainly on public areas, such as lobby of each building, mosque, classrooms, dining rooms and meeting rooms. The disinfectant spraying is expected to mitigate the spread of COVID-19 as well as to maintain the health of Lemhannas RI personnel.

The program activity was directly witnessed by Lemhannas RI Vice Governor Air Marshal Wieko

Syofyan, Prime Secretary Commissioner General of Police Dr. Mochamad Iriawan, S.H., M.M., M.H. and Chief of General Affairs Bureau Brigadier General of Police Drs. S. E. Pranggono.
